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
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## Staying In Your Own Lane

The word NO is comprised of just two letters ---- and yet it can be so hard to say and so easily misunderstood.

At WHTN we've had to say no to a number of potential Bridges guests over the years. The NO wasn't necessarily about the quality of the guest or even my interest level of the subject. Most of the time the no was just because that subject wasn't a good fit for the Bridges show. For example, we've never done a Bridges show in support of a political candidate or party. Of course, I vote and pray for our governmental leaders – I just never made that a part of the Bridges show.

### No One is Beyond Redemption

I made an intentional decision when the Bridges show launched – to focus on the hope we have in Christ. I want Bridges to be a show that encourages everyday people (like me) to boldly live out their faith in Christ. I want to open the conversation to include tough topics like adultery and addiction – and loudly declare that faith in Christ changes everything. Because of Christ no one is beyond redemption – and no one is left alone without hope. In order to accomplish that on Bridges sometimes that two letter word no had to be a part of the conversation. It isn't necessarily easy to say no---- but it is necessary to say no. I like to think of it as "Staying in My Lane".

We all have a lane – a place that highlights who we are and accentuates our God given unique gifts and talents. We live in a world filled with choices and opportunities. There are many good options readily available but finding your lane is about what's best for you. Finding your lane starts with knowing when to say Yes and when to say No.

### Way Over My Head

Clearly, there is nothing wrong with Biblical Prophecy. I enjoy studying Biblical Prophecy. The issue is that I am not an expert on the subject. I put myself in a position where I was out of my lane – and it showed in the interview. My bad choice taught me lots of lessons about finding and staying in my lane.

Find what you're good at and do lots of it. If it's outside of your expertise or interests– say no and move on. The word no may be hard to say or even misunderstood but sometimes it's just necessary. There is a lane that's just for you. You will find that lane when you learn when to say yes and when to say no.

### So Are You Happy Or Joyful?

Happiness. Everybody wants to be happy, right? I mean, that's what we're all chasing, isn't it? Our culture is obsessed with, "Finding the Thing that Makes You Happy." Magazines are filled with self-helps articles like "10 Ways to Find Happiness," and, "25 Ways to a Happier Life." Even our Declaration of Independence written by Thomas Jefferson in 1776 stated a right to "the pursuit of happiness."

But how long are people happy once they obtain the thing that makes them happy? Getting a new car or house may make them happy but then trouble hits at work or in a marriage and they aren't happy anymore. People may want happiness, but what they really need is joy.

Joy is a person's "internal" state of being whereas happiness is an emotion affected by external factors such as a promotion, a new car, a relationship, a breakup or a death. Happi-

## Can What I Say On Facebook Cause Me Legal Problems?



"I can't believe I was fired from my job over simply expressing my personal views about outcome of the election," exclaimed a client who recently called our office to inquire whether her employer could really get away with this.

Presently our firm represents several individuals in five states, all of whom were terminated from career-long positions over comments they posted on their private Facebook pages. We could never have predicted such an influx of cases even three years ago.

Platforms like Facebook, Twitter and other social media have become the modern public square in which individuals freely express often diverse views on public issues affecting their local communities and the nation. The Supreme Court, in *Packingham v. North Carolina*, recognized that social media, like all forms of free speech is protected by "a fundamental First Amendment principle" that all persons have access to places where they can speak. But *Packingham* addressed whether government may restrict access to social media. What about private employers? May they impose such restrictions on their employees who seek to exercise this right during off-duty time?

Many employers today have social media policies that broadly proscribe certain types of expression by their employees, even during their off hours. Unwary employees are increasingly finding themselves ensnared by these policies, particularly when their comments run counter to the prevailing mainstream narrative on a given issue. The following are just a few examples of employees whom we are representing that lost their jobs over Facebook posts:

- A nurse in North Carolina commented "All lives matter and BLM is a political trick to upset a group of people to riot and terrorize!"
- An anesthetist in Florida remarked on her Facebook: "These acts [referring to Antifa] are not all about injustice and racism. The devil incarnate is out in the form of rioters and assaulters."
- A state employee in Tennessee criticized a state policy calling for the early release of drug offenders in response to the Covid-19 crisis by stating: "The Governor is forbidding parole officers to put parolees in jail for unlimited drug abuse."
- The director of a library in Kentucky was fired for posting: "The concept of race is not biblical. There are not higher races and lower races of people. There is only ONE race, the human race."

In many of these cases, the employer would never have known of the employee's Facebook post had others, who negatively reacted to it, not contacted them. The practice of attacking another on the basis of one's disagreement with their social media remarks is called "doxing". Doxing is defined as the act of searching for and publishing private or identifying information about a particular individual on the internet, typically with malicious intent of bringing about their termination.

### Alexis Proliferates God's Love and Joy



Meet Alexis. Alexis is a spunky and adorable 6-year-old girl. Her life suddenly changed in 2019 when she was diagnosed with a femur fracture. It was eventually determined that the femur fracture was a result of Gorham-Stout Disease, a rare bone disorder characterized by progressive bone loss (osteolysis) and the rapid reproduction (proliferation) of lymphatic vessels.

Alexis underwent a partial amputation of her left leg to remove the diseased bone in 2020. Her leg was then reconfigured through a surgery

called a Rotationplasty. Her Rotationplasty surgery was very specialized and involved removing her entire femur and then reshaping the top of her tibia and rotating it 180 degrees so it could be inserted into her hip socket. Her ankle joint now functions as her new knee joint and she recently traveled to Dallas to receive her prosthesis. Despite her challenges, Alexis continues to thrive with a proliferation of resilience and joy.

In anticipation of her Rotationplasty, Tucker's House completed modifications to the house of this family to ease their transition home from the hospital. With the help of some of our generous community partners like Brasfield & Gorrie and Hiller, Tucker's House retrofit her bathroom with a zero-entry

shower so that she can safely access the shower whether she is using crutches or a roll-in shower chair. We also poured a concrete pad at the back of the house where the family enters from outside, installed a ramp, and widened doorways in their house to provide safe access for Alexis.

Alexis' mom, Anna, reports that "Alex's diagnosis put our family on a path we didn't expect. There have been years of ups and downs, disappointments, joys, and sorrows. Through it all God has continuously shown His love and care through the people He has placed in our lives and the doors opened and closed. Tucker's House, along with the many individuals and businesses involved in the organization have been an incredible part of Alex's story and loved her and our family. Alex has continued to bring joy to those around her as she has smiled and sung through so many hard things." The family has set up an Instagram page (@alex\_fearfullywonderfullymade) if you would like to follow the poignant story of this special family.

Tucker's House is a 501(c)3 non-profit in Middle Tennessee that serves families who have children with disabilities by making their homes safer and more accessible. ### Is Critical Race Theory Compatible with the Bible?

Revelation 7:9 describes a diverse yet unified multitude from every nation, tribe, peoples and language, worshipping God in heaven.

Harmonious relationships have always been God's desire for humanity. In fact, the Bible has a lot to say about topics like diversity, inclusion and other aspects of critical race theory (CRT).

While some CRT terminology is new or redefined, the ideology behind it has been around for a long time.

Christianity teaches there is no favoritism with God. As a follower of Jesus, I am called to pursue peace; love and forgive unconditionally; seek justice for all; and treat everyone with dignity and respect. Since every life matters and is of great value to our Creator, they should all matter to us as well.


Scripture condemns discriminating against others based on outward appearances and identifies it as a symptom of a much deeper problem. Engaging in the sin of partiality makes us "judges with evil motives," as the apostle James put it.

And therein lies my problem with critical race theory: It is based on inherently racist and unbiblical assumptions, viewing virtually every historical or present-day event through the lens of race and oppression.

Far from promoting constructive dialogue and seeking common ground, CRT divides along racial lines by creating negative stereotypes rather than seeing people as individuals made in God's image.

Criticizing or even questioning CRT is considered racist, and nothing but acquiescence is permitted. CRT essentially condenses power into a small group of social elites who typically oppress and cancel those who disagree with them.

No one can look into the mind of another person to see if he or she is a racist, yet CRT advocates claim to have the ability to know the unknowable. White people are judged as a homogeneous group of racial supremacists and everyone else as victims of systemic racism.



This is demeaning to all races and creates widespread mistrust and acrimony. Jesus taught His followers to forgive as He forgives, but with CRT there is no forgiveness or redemption; rather, there is endless condemnation and shame.

The theory (some would say agenda) also ignores decades of progress in racial relations and the many achievements by people of color.

Martin Luther King Jr.'s dream of the day when his children would not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character, has turned into a nightmare of segregation and victimhood.

While many well-meaning Christians and churches have embraced CRT, they miss the deceptiveness of this teaching. The Bible moves us toward systemic unity, reconciliation and healing. CRT is built on the framework of atheistic Marxism and seeks to normalize systemic disunity, turmoil and pain. Jesus told His disciples they would recognize false teachers by their fruit. The fruit of CRT is division, destruction and lack of forgiveness.

Certainly there have been many horrible acts of racism in our nation's history—as there have been in numerous parts of the world—and slavery was a sad reality that resulted in civil war.

I don't know of anyone who denies these acts, claims there is no racism today or believes we don't have more work to do in race relations. But CRT is not the way forward.

The truth is that humanity has a systemic sin problem, and racism is one of its symptoms. If we want positive change instead of more division, we must address the real problem rather than its symptoms. Only Jesus can change the heart of a racist. The good news is that salvation is an equal outcome for anyone who places faith in Him.



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

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# Jasmine Brady

## *A Musical Family Legacy*

Perhaps music is in Jasmine Brady's blood. It's certainly in her heritage, including her mother Candy Hemphill Christmas; her grandparents, Joel and LaBreeska Hemphill; and her maternal great aunt and uncle, Vestal and Howard Goodman of the Happy Goodmans. However, as Jasmine experienced, having such a robust musical heritage does not mean automatic entry into musical success.

Jasmine retells the story she has often heard: "Soon after I was born, I was part of the group traveling on the bus with my mother and family and grew up singing such songs as 'He's Still Working on Me.'" As a child, Jasmine began singing and writing songs while appearing on several Gaither Homecoming videos and in the Gaither Homecoming Kids' video series. As a young teenager, she started writing songs and leading her youth group in worship, and later, leading worship around the country.

Jasmine advances her story: "Worship leading became a vital part of my life as I began to feel the call of God. After graduating from high school, I went to Lee University and became part of the A Cappella Ensemble—the Voices of Lee—a world-renowned vocal ensemble. During this time my parents started a church, Regeneration Nashville; the call to worship grew strong in my heart. After two years, I left the Voices of Lee and began traveling home on the weekends to lead worship for my parents' church."

In her late teens and early twenties and while leading worship, Jasmine pursued a solo career. She was writing more than ever and knocking on every door that could possibly offer entry. No matter how hard she tried to advance her personal career, every door stayed bolted. Jasmine couldn't understand. She knew God had called her to music, so why wouldn't He want her to use the gifts He'd given her? Why wouldn't He want her to carry on the family's legacy?



Jasmine was on the precipice of an incredible life lesson arranged by God. She continues, "What I didn't realize is that everything must come in God's way and His time. God wasn't interested in how good I could sing or write; He was after my worship."

When every prospect for her music resulted in a definite no, Jasmine learned she "had to lay every gift that God had given me at the foot of the cross and submit my life to His will."

God's greatest lessons often come through His word when individuals slow down enough to listen. "The Lord spoke two scriptures quietly to my heart: but seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you (Matthew 6:33) and trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths" (Proverbs 3:5-6).

JonMichael Brady, also from a Gospel music family—Dad Keith Brady of "The Bradys"—started playing drums on the worship team at Regeneration Nashville. In due time on June 7, 2009, Jasmine married that wonderful man, and the couple now has two of God's greatest gifts, children Cooper and Adele (ages 9 and 5, respectively). Jasmine beams: "Cooper loves to sing, and he plays a drum called the cajon next to his dad in our worship band every Sunday. Adele loves to sing and worship the Lord, too. She's always singing and writing songs. Music is in both of them for sure!" Could their music legacy be shooting out another branch?

When Jasmine was sixteen, her mom, Candy Christmas, founded the Bridge Ministry, a non-profit homeless outreach. Shortly after she married Jon-Michael, Jasmine went to work for the Ministry and is now a staff member of The Bridge, Inc. Almost every Tuesday night she is under Jefferson Street Bridge leading Nashville's homeless and poor in worship to Jesus. She continues to lead worship for Regeneration Church Nashville, pastored by her father Rev. Kent Christmas. Jasmine continues, "Although I was leading worship weekly, I had completely stopped writing songs and pursuing a personal music career. I decided that if that kind of career were God's will, He would do it His way in His time."



Peace, peace, Shalom." For the first time in almost nine years, I wrote a song. God began giving me worship music which I introduced to our church.

"Over the last year, while walking through the pandemic and my husband's joblessness, I've stayed at Jesus's feet in worship while songs like 'Faith Arise' and 'God is in Control' have come pouring out of my soul. Soon, our church and online viewers asked where they could purchase my music. We decided to do a project so these precious people could sing these songs over their situations as well. My latest album, 'Shalom,' came into being."

Over the last several years, the Lord has emphasized to Jasmine that "worshipping Him is what we people were created to do. We should worship Him in our jobs, in cleaning our houses, in raising our kids, in driving our cars, and in personal prayer. I think that if my career had taken off when I wanted it to, my life might have become about fame, money, writing ability, and success." She recalls, "one time when I was praying, the Lord spoke to my heart, saying, 'If you never sing professionally, will I still be enough for you?' I sat praying on the floor, stunned, and through tears and anguish told the Lord, 'Yes.' Honestly, I never planned on singing or writing professionally again. I had to learn to worship Him under the Bridge with the homeless and in our little church, and that had to be enough—because He is enough."

"The only thing I knew to do was worship. As He had reminded me years ago, I knew to seek Him and all other things would fall into place (Matthew 6:30). I knew to trust Him and He would direct my path (Proverbs 3:5-6). So, I sat down at the beautiful baby grand piano that my grandmother had given me before she passed away. It was the piano that she and my grandfather sat at and wrote so many inspiring songs. I didn't know what to say, but I touched the keys and the Holy Spirit gave me the words "Peace, peace, be still and know that I am God.



Today Jasmine stands back and looks at the goodness of God. The Bible says, Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone, but if it dies, it bears much fruit (John 12:24). "Everything from the Lord must come to a place where it dies so He can bless it, break it, then multiply it. What I see now is that my ambition, pride, and self-centered mentality is what had to die. 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

### GOD'S PLAN FOR SERVICE

#### The Devil Prowls

Did you know THE DEVIL PROWLs? 1 Peter 5 tells us about the devil prowling beginning in verse 6 which reads:

*Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that He might lift you up in due time. Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you. Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. Resist him, standing firm in the faith, because you know that the family of believers throughout the world is undergoing the same kind of sufferings.*



While we were created in the image of God, our human nature means that we are tempted to sin continually and, as a result, none of us is without sin (Proverbs 20:9, John 8:7). Since the time of Adam, man has been sinful. However, that does not mean we should just accept our sinfulness. We are offered forgiveness of our many sins if we but ask for forgiveness through the grace of God (Acts 2:38).

But let's go back to this Devil mentioned in 1 Peter 5:6-9. Why does the devil prowl? A prowl suggests a desire to be undetected. As a result, we make bad decisions thinking we did it all on our own without realizing the role of the devil in suggesting sinful behavior. We must know our Bible well enough to detect the difference between sinful behavior and God inspired behavior. When we know the difference and sinful options are put before us, our conscience will tell us the difference. But our conscience does not control the choice we make. The sinful behavior might look very attractive at the moment and all of us are capable of rationalizing which means finding numerous excuses for engaging in the bad behavior. The devil is very skillful in helping us find rationalizations. When we fall for the rationalization, it means the devil has been successful in his prowling around. The devil got you.

Now you might reason, this isn't me. I have not robbed a liquor store or committed any other crime so I have eluded the devil all day today. But think of the moment in which you were angry with someone or thing. Consider the remark you made that would not be considered kind or the commitment you made and did not keep. What was going on in your head during those events? Were you talking with the devil or not being on guard and thus letting the devil get too close to you? Where was God in your thinking when these thoughts entered your mind? What was your attitude like toward others, toward God and toward yourself?

The devil is never far away and is watching for the right moment to strike. What is the devil telling you right now? He might be saying, 'I don't prowl. I'm your friend. I just want you to have a good time.' Then if your "good time" gets you in trouble, what does the devil do? Listen to him laugh because you fell for it.

While you consider yourself a wonderful person, are there times when your guard is let down so that the devil might strike? Think about how to keep that guard up. Part of that is avoiding places where you will be tempted and avoiding the people whose influence on you is negative. The devil is on the prowl as we saw in 1 Peter 5. Don't let him get you.

### Why Is My Air Conditioner Making Noise?

After a spell in the sweltering sun, there's nothing like relaxing in the comfort of your cool, air conditioned home. But every now then, your HVAC system may start to make unseemly noises. We're not talking about the garden variety HVAC noise that comes with healthy functionality, but unusual noises that are cause for concern. #### Common HVAC noises (and what they mean)

- **HVAC noise #1: squealing or screeching**

The most common culprit of a squealing air conditioner is the fan belt in the blower. When you're experiencing this unseemly sound, it usually means that either the fan belt either needs to be replaced or the motor needs to be lubricated. These issues can be quickly handled by an HVAC technician.

- **HVAC noise #2: pulsating or "thwapping" noise**

If your air conditioner is making a pulsating noise (aka "thwapping"), it often means that an object is obstructing the fan. This is most likely the case if the sound comes and goes with the airflow. However, if the noise is audible from inside the home, the vibration may be caused by a loose part or panel. If this situation is left unattended, it can cause a substantial amount of wear and tear on your AC unit.

- **HVAC noise #3: rattling, buzzing, or banging**

If your air conditioner is making a rattling, buzzing, or banging sound, it is very likely that something is loose or broken. These types of HVAC noises can also mean that your unit's compressor is failing. If you're experiencing



any one of these sounds, we recommend that you shut your air conditioning system off until a qualified technician can conduct a full HVAC inspection.

- **HVAC noise #4: high-pitched whistling**

If a high-pitched whistling or screaming sound is coming from your AC unit you should shut off the power to the unit on your circuit

breaker immediately. This sound is typically associated with the compressor or refrigerant pressure. Contact our expert HVAC technicians immediately if your home's air conditioner is making this type of sound.

- **HVAC noise #5: hissing**

This type of sound could be coming from the compressor or a leaking air duct. If it's from the compressor you should switch the unit off and call a technician immediately. If the hissing is coming from a leak in your air ducts, it will need to be serviced but it isn't an emergency.

#### Routine HVAC maintenance is important

The HVAC noises mentioned are largely avoidable when you schedule annual HVAC inspections. HVAC maintenance is essential in making sure everything runs smoothly. Reducing the noise coming from your home's air conditioning system may require cleaning fan blades, lubricating bearings, isolating your compressor, removing clogs, or clearing your drains. 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# Concrete and Summer Months

In the summer months, a lot can happen to the concrete in and around our homes. And with more people out and about, concrete issues might feel more noticeable – and more annoying. From a sunken sidewalk slab to a cracked concrete driveway, the climate of the region has a direct impact on the soil and, ultimately, the concrete on top of it.

It's not uncommon for many regions to experience a lot of moisture in the early summer months. The rain saturates the soil and can soften it, making concrete slabs sink. Rain and water can also wash away the dirt under and around concrete. This erodes the support underneath the concrete, causing it to crack and drop.

Dry weather and the hot summer sun can also dry out the soil around your home. As the moisture in the soil evaporates, the dirt shrinks – or takes up

### The Secret to Perfect Relationships



The one you love is going to hurt you. I know it's disappointing, because no one wants to be hurt by the one they love. But it's going to happen. Not because they're a bad person, but simply because they are human. Humans are flawed, have a propensity to think of themselves before others, and make mistakes. Scripture reminds us "There is no one righteous, no not one" and "all have sinned and fallen short." The one you love is going to hurt you.

Avoiding hurt in relationships is a hopeless proposition. The secret is that it's not about avoiding hurt. It is about knowing what to do when you are hurt. God knows all about being hurt by the one you love. He loves you. He loves me. He knows we have, and will continue, to fall short and hurt him. We hurt him by all the ways we choose ourselves over him, just like we hurt each other in relationship. But that doesn't stop him from loving us. What's more, he chooses the suffering of being hurt by the ones he loves rather than be without our love.

We hurt the ones we love in the same way our sin hurts God. He says our sin separates us from him. We know this is true from our own relationships with each other. When the one you love hurts you, you feel separated from them. There is a break or at least a fault in the relationship.

So, what do you do when the one you love is going to hurt you? The answer lies in this truth: Relationship wounds are healed in relationship. We long for the one who hurt us to redeem us. We want the guilty party to make us right again. Unfortunately, our flawed nature often turns to blame and accusation rather than repair and reconciliation. However, God, the example of perfect love, does something very different with us.

When God could have demanded for us as the guilty party to go first to make things right, he chose to go first. "While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." God embraced his suffering instead of rejecting it. He went first to restore our relationship. And he calls us to follow his example with each other. True repair requires our longing to reconcile to be more important than our desire to blame. God's path to repair is this: love first, accountability second. In repair, we affirm our love before, during, and after accountability. Repair affirms my true importance to the one who hurt me. Leaning toward the one that hurt me reaffirms that, despite their mistake, they are still loved. As we grow, we learn the areas we injure each other. The perfect relationship is one where we protect the one we love from our weaknesses, and then repair well when we fail.

The one you love is going to hurt you. But that's okay. Because you love them. And they love you. So, pursue the perfection of relationship- in injury, repair, and joy. All it takes is some hard work. So lean in. Take a risk. Get help if you need it. Love is worth it.
